## New FLOW "please don't give up on us" HotLine

To all those who have become frustrated with the series of difficulties we've had with the FLOW HotLine, I express my sympathy and apologies. Though the original answering machine was not as reliable as we needed it to be, we have finally found a more reliable, long-term alternative.

The new HotLine, at (716) 234-3893, is a voice mailbox, which means that accessing the HotLine will be slightly different. There are *two* most important things to remember when accessing stored messages:

1. Enter the pass code

BEFORE the greeting ends, or you will be leaving a message instead of accessing voice mail.

2. DO NOT DELETE the messages you have listened to.

I hope that the HotLine will prove to be a reliable way for club members to communicate. If you have any problems accessing the HotLine, please call me at (716) 288-5232.

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
Use the HotLine for:

- *◊ checking weekly updates to trips and events*
- checking for the latest meeting times and locations (general meeting or steering committee)
- ◊ announcing spontaneous trips
- leaving any paddling-related message for club members

Please **do not** perform any of the following functions, even though voice mail will happily let you:

- *◊ deleting messages*
- $\diamond$  changing the greeting
- *◊ changing the pass code*

We will be monitoring the HotLine and deleting old messages on a weekly basis.

To access the FLOW HotLine:

1. Dial 716 234-3893 from a touch-tone phone.

2. To listen to messages left by other paddlers, press the remote access code any time during the greeting. After entering the remote access code, listen to instructions for how to access messages.

3. To leave a message for other paddlers, listen to the greeting and leave a brief message after the tone.

### The Truth about River Gods

by Hathor, Egyptian goddess of Love and Fertility

You found out how to roll at pool practice in the winter. In the spring you took your first river trip, and as you began to learn the subtleties of river etiquette, you finally felt like you understood this whole paddling phenomenon. Then, just when you had a grip on concepts like eddy-hopping, low bracing, and shuttle protocol, you started noticing some truly unexplainable things.

A swimmer sends a blessing after his paddle as it floats downstream away from him. Everyone else in your trip unquestioningly and without verbal acknowledgment runs a particular slot...backwards. A small but growing number of paddlers flamboyantly bedeck themselves and their boats with utter disregard for current fashions or time-honored practicality.

What you've stumbled on is a complicated tapestry of myth and ritual more ancient than the rivers themselves. You have encountered the modern veneration of the River Gods.

We all know they're out there....it doesn't take long before we pray to them at every put in and thank them at the take out. We make sacrifices of time, money, sleep, common sense, and adrenaline, not to mention the occasional paddle, pair of nose clips, or unfortunate dry bag. We are slaves to their whims and servants of their fancy.

But who are they? A search through modern literature on mythology confirms that the gods of water are many and varied. One can only presume that whether the waves we ride come from wind or from rocks, the gods receive our offerings and hear our prayers:

Poseidon-Greek god of the sea, horses, and earthquakes. The sea is his kingdom.

Susanowo-Shinto god of sea or storms. (The name Susanowo means impetuous.)

**Aphrodite**–Greece goddess born from the foam of the sea. Goddess of beauty, love, and fertility.

**Njord**–Norse god of the sea and winds, and protector of sailors. Married to Skadi, a great huntress who lives in the forest. She lives apart from her husband, who cannot bear to live away from the sea.

**Ea**–Sumerian and Babylonian creator of humankind, patron of the arts, and dual god of wisdom and fresh water.

**Yurlunggur**–the Australian Great Rainbow Snake, a creator of landscape features, particularly rivers and water holes.

**Qat** and **Marawa**–Melanesian pair of tricksters, bringers of life and death. Associated with seafaring and canoe-building.


**Pahmuri-Mahse**–Amazonian hero who was ordered by the Sun god to paddle a huge, anaconda-shaped canoe upriver. A community was founded at every place the canoe stopped.

**Khnum**–Egyptian "Lord of the Cool Water" and god of the First Cataract of the Nile. He controlled the splitting of the waters, and therefore the fertility of the land.

**Thetis**–Greek water nymph, pursued by a mortal who fell in love with and eventually won her.

**Sebek**–Egyptian crocodile god of rivers and lakes. Rules by terror; his followers make many sacrifices to keep him happy.

The River Gods are out there, and they're on the rivers, lakes, and seas with us. The next time you see something outrageous you truly can't explain (like sequins on a PFD?), remember that in return for their protection, we must pay homage to the masters of the waters we call home.
