Access Granted On Moose River

ALBANY - A 12-mile stretch of river that passes through a private estate in the Adirondacks has been opened to limited public access under a lawsuit settlement announced Monday by the landowners, environmental activists and state officials.

The agreement ends a dispute that began in June 1991, when five canoeists and kayakers paddled the south branch of the Moose River in defiance of "no trespassing" signs posted by the Adirondack League Club.

The boaters, who staged the trip to assert their common-law right to travel on all navigable waterways, called the settlement a precedent-setting victory.

"When we set out on this journey, we had no idea it would take nine years to complete, but we have been successful," said Tom Kligerman, the Sierra Club activist who organized the excursion by the "Moose River Five." "We have established once and for all that the public right of passage is the law on all of New York's navigable rivers."

Lawyers for the Adirondack League Club, a 53,000-acre hunting and fishing preserve in Herkimer County, called the agreement "a workable balance among the parties' different goals" - including allowing public access, protecting property rights and preserving the wild character of the river.

"The lawsuit was brought in 1991 to protect the club's property rights against those who sought to ignore them," the club said in a news release. "That goal has been achieved."

Under the settlement, the river is open to nonmotorized boats from May 1 to Oct. 15 on days when the water level at the McKeever Dam, just downstream from the club's property, is at least 2.65 feet. Paddlers must register at the state's Moose River Plains Recreation Area, sign a liability waiver, complete the trip in a single day and stay off the river banks except when necessary to portage around obstacles. No swimming, fishing, hunting or picnicking is allowed on the club's property. Club officials said they intend to enforce these terms strictly, and

warned that the trip is difficult and not necessarily safe.

"Only experienced paddlers should attempt the traverse, and only when they are confident of completing the entire trip in one day," the club said.

The club sued the five paddlers in 1991 after the state Department of Environmental Conservation refused to press trespassing charges against them. The state and several environmental groups joined the case on the side of the defendants, arguing in favor of public access to navigable streams and rivers even when they cross private lands.

The case ultimately made it to the Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, which ruled in 1998 that the common-law right of passage on navigable waterways - traditionally used for transporting cargo and floating logs downstream - should also extend to recreational boating.

But the court stopped short of declaring whether the south branch of the Moose River - a rocky, shallow stream repeatedly interrupted by falls and rapids - met the legal definition of "navigable." It left this issue to be settled at trial in state Supreme Court.

"This is the ultimate win-win situation," said Neil Woodworth, an attorney for the Adirondack Mountain Club, a lobbying group for canoeists and hikers. "We have gotten reasonable public access to the waterway in the key months. ... We could have gone to trial and, perhaps, won the case. But you would have had a hostile landowner. We've averted all of that."

Kligerman said he hoped the settlement would set a precedent, dissuading other landowners from trying to block public access to navigable

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streams across their property.

"What we would like to see is for the state to come out with a list of the rivers that meet the test of navigability", Kligerman said. "The state's in a much better position now to make a public statement about what the navigation law in New York state is."

But Jennifer Post, a spokeswoman for the DEC, said the settlement does not set a clear precedent for other rivers.

"Obviously we're very pleased with the outcome of this case, because the [settlement] gives people access to this stretch of the Moose River," Post said. "Unfortunately, however, the legal staff does not believe this can be used to generalize to activities on other streams in the state."

A spokeswoman for Attorney General Eliot Spitzer, whose office opposed the club's lawsuit on behalf of state government, agreed that the settlement itself applies only to the Moose River.

"We're not aware of any other situations in which a landowner actually put a wire across a river and said 'No trespassing,' which is what happened here," said Judith Enck, Spitzer's environmental policy adviser.

John Marwell, an attorney for the Adirondack League Club, said circumstances of the Moose River case are unique. He pointed out that the public already has access to the river on either side of the club's property, and that the 12-mile stretch through private land is short enough for experienced paddlers to travel in a single day.

"I don't see that this [settlement] is going to put any pressure on anyone, because each river is such a unique situation," Marwell said. "Is it an example of how a compromise can be achieved? . . . Yes. It's an example that's situated to this river."

Woodworth said water levels recorded over the past 25 years at McKeever Dam by the U.S. Geological Survey have usually been above 2.65 feet in May, June and early July. They tend to be lower in late July and August, and then rise again in September and October, he said.

After a wet spring, the level posted Monday on the USGS Internet site was 2.97 feet, several

inches above the level specified in the settlement, Kligerman said.

Kligerman said the Moose River Five - which also includes Jeff Jones of Albany, Lorraine Van Hatten and Carl Anderson of the Utica area and Bob Wolff of Albany - are planning to celebrate with another paddle through the club's property this summer.
